Emergency alerts are posted to the city website during an emergency situation, when appropriate.

The city implemented this communications strategy most recently, on March 13, 2017, when it used SwiftReach, social media, and the website to inform residents that City Hall would be closed the next day due to the impending snow, and trash and recycling operations were suspended. The city also used social media to inform residents that Summit Public Schools were closed. The Chief Communications Officer, Mayor, and Public Information Associate were involved in communications efforts.
